June marks my tenth month here as Pastor. I want you to know that it has been one blessing after the next. The passion and excitement that permeate the congregation right now really energize me and I look forward to each new day. Not many can say that about their job. For the whole church this has been a real time of transition as we have gotten used to each other and, like any transition, there is a time of excitement that ultimately wanes and the real business of change begins. As the “honeymoon” period comes to a close, I expect that old tensions will begin to resurface--tensions that had gone dormant during the eagerness of something new, but never really went away. Old turf wars come to the fore, nervousness about new directions start to get vocalized, axes start grinding. It is expected that as things begin to grow, change and transform that there would be some discomfort and apprehension because of the uncertainty and the foray into unfamiliar territory. Even when dynamics change for the better and we begin to see the results we prayed for, it can still feel like much of it is moving faster than we like, and that we are unprepared.

As we begin to feel the discomfort of change, even good change, I want to offer a couple of thoughts. First, the reality is that change will, at one time or another, be uncomfortable. This is really a sign of good energy happening. A little discomfort helps us stretch, grow, and become that which God has called us to. Second, with change comes excitement but also disappointment. As the church moves into the future, we all have certain expectations about what that will look like. The truth is that some of those expectations will not be met, and others may be met in ways other than how we wanted. Whatever our ideal for the church is in our minds, God will point us to God’s ideal and it will inevitably look a little different than what we expected.

Finally, and maybe this is the hard one: as the church changes, your role in the church may also change. This can often leave us feeling a little lost, or even a little left out. However, changing roles is an important part of a growing community. It allows room for others, it allows one to try new ways and it stretches people and challenges them to grow in their own faith.

God is doing wonderful things in our midst and we have been faithful in responding to God’s call. As we continue to respond, it may get a little uncomfortable. If you start to feel this, I invite you to talk about it. Talk to me, talk to others in the church: not to complain about the changes, but to acknowledge the difficulty we all have with change and to really be a community that is there for one another. I am so excited for the future. I pray you are too.

Joy, Joy, Joy, Joy Down in my Heart!

Jeff Woods, our Assistant General Secretary of American Baptist Churches USA, recently took a look at a study of major denominations called FACT2010. In looking over the data Jeff concluded the following:

Joy is a significant factor in worship among the growing, healthy, and readiness congregations in this survey. As churches begin to grow, the worship can no longer be all those things to the people who attend. The one thread maintained as it grows, is the thread of joy in worship.

Over many other variables, the consistent factor in churches that were ready to grow is the experience of Joy in worship. This tells us a couple of facts about our congregation. First, that if our joy is an indicator of our readiness, this congregation is ready because I feel that there is a tremendous amount of joy in the worship we experience together. However, it also tells us that joy in worship is the factor, when thinking about changes, which ought to trump other considerations. Just a little food for thought as we grow into the future.

All Church Hike!

WHEN after church Sunday, June 26, 2011. What does after church mean? Grab a QUICK bite from hospitality then gather around the Chaney clan. Hopefully, we will be organized for transportation by 11:30 and on the road shortly after.

Where are we going & how difficult will it be: right now we don't know! Due to the excessive snowpack this year, we are not sure where we will be going. More than likely, it will be somewhere in **Millcreek Canyon**. Most of the trails go UP which means there is some level of difficulty.

How long will it take? Hopefully everyone will be done hiking by 4:30-5:00 but you don't have to hike that long (or as far as everyone).

Maggie's vision: possibly Grandeur Peak* which is 5½-6 miles round trip with an elevation change of ~2600 feet. Those who are in good shape and are able to hike at a faster-than-Maggie pace will be lead by Matt and/or Evan and who will complete the whole hike. For those who are not so fast at hiking, Jerry and/or Maggie will be going a little slower and there is a good chance of doing the whole hike, but it will probably take the entire afternoon. For those with small children – come and hike part of the trail – turn around when you feel you need to. In fact, everyone should feel they can turn around and go back at any time.

This isn't a race, but we are aware some people like to hike fast. This is a time for the church family to be active together in the beautiful Wasatch Mtns. We want people of all hiking abilities to feel welcome to come.

*Grandeur Peak is lower in Millcreek with an elevation of ~ 8300'. There will probably be less snow pack for this trail than others further up the canyon and with higher elevations. Grandeur can also be HOT! You MUST carry water (minimum one quart/person is recommended). Due to the length of the hike, you also need to carry a lunch and/or snack.

Please let Maggie or Jerry Chaney know if you are planning on hiking. Millcreek is a fee area so we would like to limit the number of vehicles driving in the canyon.

In 1948 a nineteen-year-old pearl diver's dreams of spending her life combing the waters of Japan's Inland Sea are shattered when she discovers she has leprosy. By law, she is exiled to an island leprosarium, where she is stripped of her dignity and instructed to forget her past. Her name is erased from her family records, and she is forced to select a new one. To the two thousand patients on the island of Nagashima, she becomes Miss Fuji. Although drugs arrest the course of Miss Fuji's disease, she cannot leave the colony. Instead, she becomes a caretaker to the other patients, and through the example of their courage, she gains insight into the deep wellspring of strength she will need to reclaim her freedom. Written with precision and eloquence, *The Pearl Diver* is a dazzling meditation on isolation and community, cruelty and compassion.
