One Connection at a Time

"Then He said to His disciples, 'The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field'" – Matthew 9:37-38

Lives are being transformed by the love of Christ manifest in the ministry of First Baptist Church. I pray that each of you have seen this in our midst. People have come to us from a lot of different places and what they experience is acceptance and affirmation; support and love; appreciation and joy. What they experience is connection. More than our wonderful worship, our stellar programming or our good times, what keeps people at First Baptist Church is a sense of belonging and a connection to the people, the ministry and the God they experience here. Furthermore, we live in a time where people are craving just that very thing. People are looking for something real that is not passive, but puts into action the words we proclaim. People are looking for community that really does bridge the divide between people. People are looking for someplace where they can be their genuine self. First Baptist Church strives to be such a place and we are pretty good at it most the time. So, if the world is hungry for what we have, why are there so many empty places at the table?

One reason is that not everyone agrees that this is a vision for the future of the church. Not everyone likes our particular values or style. Not everyone is called to be here, but for those who are, this is a vital community. Another reason people are not flocking to FBC is that some people are rejecting church-in-general based on the kinds of churches that are nothing like what I just described. It's a "baby with the bath water" kind of thing. Another is that some people have been hurt by previous churches. And while we are a place of healing from that kind of hurt, it is difficult to trust any church once you have been hurt by one. Yet another issue is that coming to church is a difficult habit to get into and easy to get out of. However, I believe one of the biggest reasons is simply that not many people know who we are. They just haven't heard about what God is doing in our midst.

So, how do we get more people around the table? How do heal brokenness? How do we grow our ministry? How do we share the love of Christ? How do we transform the world? One connection at a time. It is really time for us to share who we are with the world around us. People need to get to know who we are and what we do. Not knocking on doors and handing out tracts, but by experiencing us through our people. When we share the good things that are going on at FBC it helps people get to know us. We must explore new ways to be outside of the church and in the community but ultimately it comes down to people connecting to people. We will be talking about this a lot this year. Each group in the church will be asked to be deliberate about reaching out to families within our circle of influence. Not just to get "butts in the pew," but to help people get to know who we are and to see what God is doing.

We will begin exploring this at Celebration Sunday, September 10, 2017. It will be a wonderful time of worship and fellowship as we gather after the service at Fairmont Park for a Picnic dinner

American Baptist Response to Hurricane Harvey

American Baptists are urged to lift up those affected in both Texas and Louisiana by Hurricane Harvey, a Category 4 storm that made landfall late last month on the Texas coast. Bringing 130 mph winds and an unprecedented amount of torrential rainfall in some areas, the hurricane has resulted in flooding, power outages, downed trees and signs, major property damage, displaced residents, injuries and fatalities.

"American Baptist Home Mission Societies [ABHMS] grieves with the rest of the nation at the relentless weather pounding the Houston region right now," says ABHMS Executive Director Dr. Jeffrey Haggray. "Our disaster-recovery office has been in communication with American Baptist Churches of the South since Friday, before the weather hit.

"As soon as we receive damage assessments, we will consider how we can best assist on the long road to rebuilding homes, churches and lives, and then begin distributing relief grants," Haggray continues. "In the meantime, let us all seek comfort in the words of the age-old hymn penned by Martin Luther: 'A mighty fortress is our God, a bulwark never failing; our helper He, amid the flood of mortal ills prevailing.'"

American Baptist Churches USA General Secretary the Rev. Dr. Lee B. Spitzer invites all congregations to donate generously to One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) in response to the destruction caused by Hurricane Harvey in Texas and Louisiana.

"American Baptists across the country are a generous people, and our hearts are grieved by the human suffering we have seen since the storm made landfall," Spitzer says. "I ask that every church dedicate time this week to pray for the safety and well-being of all affected by the storm, and to express our love for them by giving sacrificially to One Great Hour of Sharing."
